The purpose of the Siouxland Recovery Fund is to support local nonprofits responding to a disaster to help meet short, intermediate, and long term needs for recovery in the Siouxland area.

The fund was activated March 19, 2020 to aid in recovery efforts for COVID-19.

The Siouxland Recovery Fund Results... (just a few)

- Boys and Girls Clubs of Siouxland provided members with hot curbside meals from 4pm-8pm
- Boys and Girls Clubs provided 151 member's families with a \$50 gift card to Fareway
- The Food Bank of Siouxland provided 44,748 people with essential grocery items between April and May
- Dakota County Voices for Food provided 4,668 people with 1,278 food boxes
- Heartland Counseling Services provided tele-health services to their clients
- Heartland Counseling Services provided housing for 3 homeless people
- Heartland Counseling Services delivered 115 lunches to Living Center members
- The Launchpad Children's Museum opened their doors back up with additional safety features and sanitizing equipment
- Mary Treglia provided COVID-19 based tutorials and daily informational podcasts in 5 different languages
- Morningside Lutheran Church expanded food distribution and increased the amount of meat and pantry items
- Nebraska Ethanol partners distributed 300 gallons of hand sanitizer to local nonprofits
- Rejoice! Food Pantry served 203 adults and 119 children from May 19-June 20
- The Salvation Army multiplied their food pantry efforts and delivered food to shut-ins
- Sioux City Community Assistance served 16 households, including 32 individuals, who had previously been homeless, with Fresh Start Home kits with items from clean towels, microwaves and beds
- Siouxland Center for Active Generations installed 4 new hand-washing stations, and implemented technology and training to give their senior members a safe place to interact with others
- Siouxland Mental Health Center provided mental health services via tele-health
- The Sunnybrook Hope Center provided boxes of essential supplies to 706 households from March 19 to April 30
- The Warming Shelter sheltered 17 people with COVID-19 symptoms, so they could quarantine themselves
- The Warming Shelter, in collaboration with the Siouxland Community Health Center, provided showers to over 300 individuals via their mobile showers



Success Stories

Sioux City Community Assistance:

One of our clients, JS, had been on the street for a long time. He was a resident at the Warming Shelter and had not been able nor ready to move into a place of his own. He is an older gentleman with both physical and chronic health disabilities who receives a social security income but was not able to break through the barriers to housing. Once he was housed in the hotel because of the COVID-19 pandemic, our office was able to make a connection with him and find a housing opportunity that would work with his specific needs. The staff member that brought him his Fresh Start Home Kit was amazed at how different he looked after just a few days of being in his own apartment. After over a month being housed, he is doing really well and has been able to maintain his appearance, health, and home. We are so proud of JS!

Rejoice! Food Pantry:

One family of seven had just moved to this area for a job. They were thrilled to have us nearly fill their trunk with groceries and tell them they could come back in two weeks if they needed help until they were caught up. People often ask for milk, and they are so thrilled now that we have it thanks to the Siouxland Recovery Fund. Families with children are especially appreciative.

A conversation heard around a coffee table at the Center. Sherry is widely known for her volunteer work at the Center. "I volunteer cleaning up. Heck I use the Center so why not give back a bit", Sherry M. shouted out over a cup of coffee with three of her friends from the Center. "We all should volunteer more often", said Mary. The lively conversation turned to the new video chat service for members. "When Michelle told me about the new video streaming opportunities. I knew it was something that I could use to talk to my family down South, and I do not have a computer at home. I am anxious to set up a time to visit over a computer. With my brothers and sisters getting older, they don't just come home as often. This will give me an opportunity to see and video chat with them, said Sherry. "My kids told me I should sign up so they could see me" Mary said as she smiled at the new opportunity
